

We can try to discern the future by studying history


- Ancient cultures differ from modern cultures

Fritz Lang – film "Metropolis" (1927)




Yayoi Kusama – installation art "Infinity Mirrored Room" (2013)


What do we see in "The Future"? How do we feel about it?

 - Despair/pessimism




What do you see in "The Future"? How do you feel about it?

- How we personally feel about the future depends a lot on our current circumstances
 - Life events, births, deaths, marriage, divorce, jobs, relationships, health...
 - Our own and those we are close to
- How we as a society feel about the future likewise depends on current circumstances
 - Technological progress, economy, war, societal changes, politics,...
- What we feel about the future is expressed as
 - Mental attitude of optimism or pessimism
 - Active or passive hope, depending on our goals and empowerment
 - Or perhaps despair and hopelessness




A brief history of optimism in the US

- Two recent periods of optimism
 - Post WWII
 - Post Cold War
- These periods coincide with
 - Stable unemployment
 - Stable inflation
- Cause or effect?



But more recently, optimism has faded





Well before 9/11 and the Recession, something else

was going on


 In 2015, sociologists identified something no one else had noticed

- Death rate of white Americans aged 45-54 stopped decreasing in 1999
- No other Western nation saw this phenomenon
- US African-Americans and Hispanics did not show this phenomenon

 Researchers tie these deaths to drug and alcohol poisoning, suicide, chronic liver diseases



All-cause mortality, ages 45–54 for US White non-Hispanics (USW), US Hispanics (USH), and six comparison countries: France (FRA), Germany (GER), the United Kingdom (UK), Canada (CAN), Australia (AUS), and Sweden (SWE).


Where does "meaning" come from?

- Meaning involves pointing to something else
 - "The meaning of a system lies outside the system" Jonathan Sacks, The Great Partnership: God, Science, and the Search for Meaning (2011)
 - The meaning of an utterance is not inside the utterance itself
 - Your life has meaning if you commit to something outside yourself
 - "The sense of the world must lie outside the world." Ludwig Wittgenstein
 - So if the Universe has meaning, it can only be found outside the Universe



Some thinkers claim that science demonstrates that the Universe is meaningless

- "The universe we observe has precisely the properties we should expect if there is, at bottom, no design, no purpose, no evil, no good, nothing but blind, pitiless indifference." -- Richard Dawkins
- "That Man is the product of causes which had no prevision of the end they were achieving; that his origin, his growth, his hopes and fears, his loves and his beliefs, are but the outcome of accidental collocations of atoms... that the whole temple of Man's achievement must inevitably be buried beneath the débris of a universe in ruins — all these things, if not quite beyond dispute, are yet so nearly certain, that no philosophy which rejects them can hope to stand." – Bertrand Russell
- "The more the universe seems comprehensible, the more it also seems pointless." Steven Weinberg



Of course! They see nothing outside the Universe

What is Reality? A meaningless universe of constantly rearranging atoms?


- Is anything new really possible?
- Science explains everything in terms of the past*
 - Causes must precede effects
 - All apparently "new" phenomena are simply rearrangements of existing inanimate (dead) entities

But now let's consider Evolution


- Evolution: the explanation of the history of life on Earth
 - Natural selection, random mutation, genetic drift, gene flow
- What is the significance of Evolution?
- Is Evolution merely the result of longterm mechanistic rearrangements of atoms...?
 - No deeper significance
 - "Nothing new here"



...or instead...

...is Evolution the way truly new phenomena appear on planet Earth and throughout the Cosmos?

- The Evolution of Life gives rise to a diversity of forms and new phenomena
 - Biological networks at many scales
 - Cooperative organisms (organelles, symbiosis) with function and purpose
 - Information and complexity
 - Consciousness, Mind, will and intention
- These are new phenomena with new causes and effects
- Compared to "Cosmic Pessimism", perhaps Evolution gives us a basis for hope
- Is Evolution the process by which God is shaping The Future?
