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MY GOAL IS TO SHOW YOU EVIDENCE THAT:

- Christianity has profoundly affected the way you think
 - ...even if you are an atheist or non-Christian (assuming you are Western-educated)
 - ...through its influence on your psychology, and the psychology of Western Europe, over many centuries
 - Psychology: your perceptions, assumptions, attention patterns, motivations, heuristics ("rules-of-thumb"), and interpretations
- Christianity thereby laid the foundation for the Renaissance, the Scientific Revolution, the Enlightenment, and the Industrial Revolution

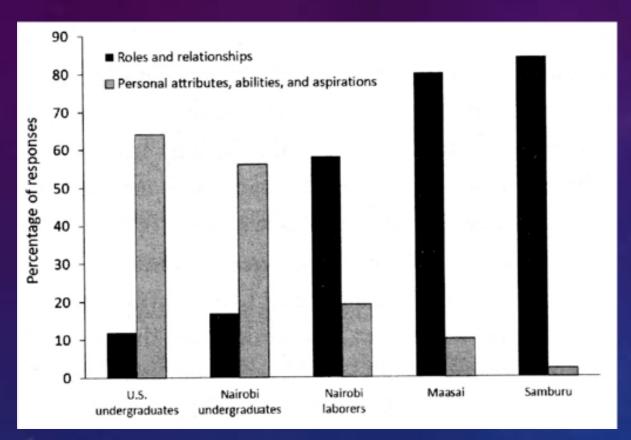

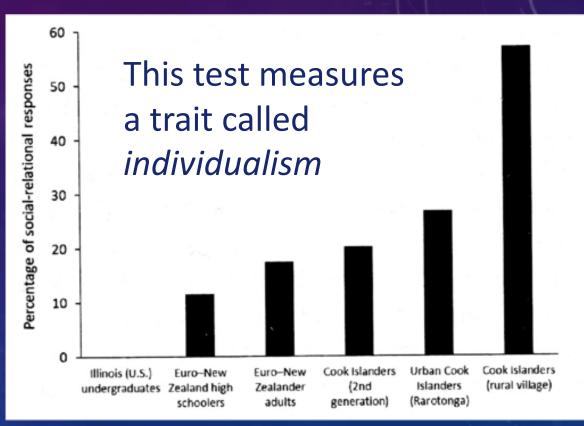

MOST OF YOU PROBABLY ANSWERED WITH YOUR PERSONAL MEMBERSHIPS, ATTRIBUTES, OR ABSTRACT COMMITMENTS

- Probably it didn't even occur to you to answer with your kin relationships
- But in most societies today (ethnolinguistic groups), and probably throughout most of human history, people would have answered with their kin relationships
- This shows that you are WEIRD ...
 - WESTERN
 - EDUCATED
 - INDUSTRIALIZED
 - RICH
 - DEMOCRATIC

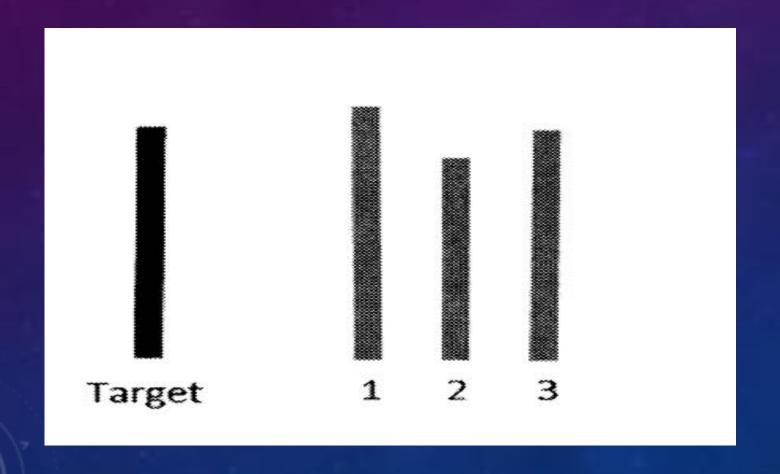

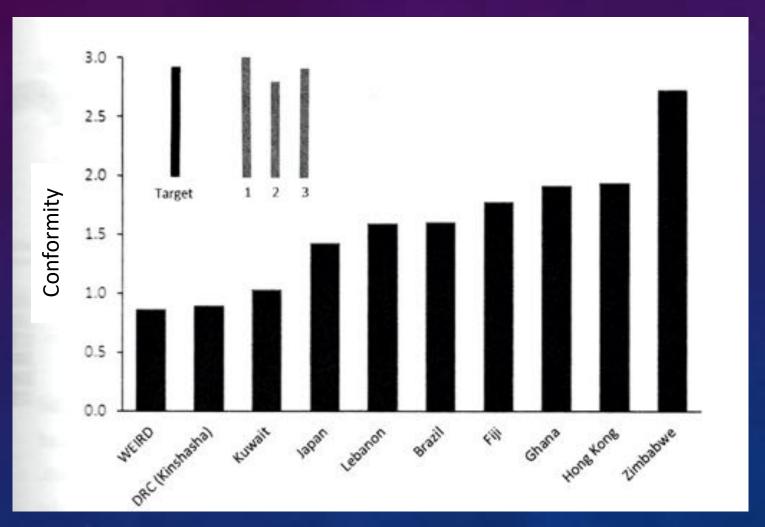

- WEIRD people are
 - Highly individualistic
 - o Self-obsessed
 - o Control-oriented
 - Nonconformist
 - o Guilt-ridden
 - Analytical

To be clear ... this applies to just about everybody in Western society, to some degree

... compared to other human societies 10

The weirdest people in the world?

"Behavioral scientists routinely publish broad claims about human psychology and behavior in the world's top journals based on samples drawn entirely from Western, Educated, Industrialized, Rich, and Democratic (WEIRD) societies."

But Henrich et al. found that

"...members of WEIRD societies, including young children, are among the least representative populations one could find for generalizing about humans."

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SO THE QUESTION IS ...

Were we always this way?

Or was there ever a time when Europeans were more like the rest of humanity?

If so, when was that?

... and how did we get to be the way we are now?

... AND HOW CAN WE EVEN HOPE TO ANSWER SUCH QUESTIONS?

- We can't go back in time to perform psychological tests on Europeans from Long Ago
- But Henrich's method is to assume:
 - Human psychology is encoded in human institutions (customs, norms)
 - We can learn about past psychology by studying past institutions
- Henrich assembles a great deal of psychological, anthropological, sociological, and historical scholarship to try to do this

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BRIEF ASIDE: "MODERN SCIENCE" IS (1) EMPIRICAL AND (2) MATHEMATICAL

• "Modern science" began during the Scientific Revolution, in Europe during the 16th and 17th centuries

• Empirical:

- o Francis Bacon's philosophy -- inductive approach to nature
- "scientific method" centers on experimental research, including artificial experiments to provide additional observations of a phenomenon

Mathematical:

o "Philosophy [i.e., physics] is written in this grand book—I mean the universe—which stands continually open to our gaze... It is written in the language of mathematics, and its characters are triangles, circles, and other geometrical figures, without which it is humanly impossible to understand a single word of it..."

Galileo, Il Saggiatore (1623)

Remember our psychological tests?

WEIRD people like to think in terms of:

Abstract categories (not only concrete objects)

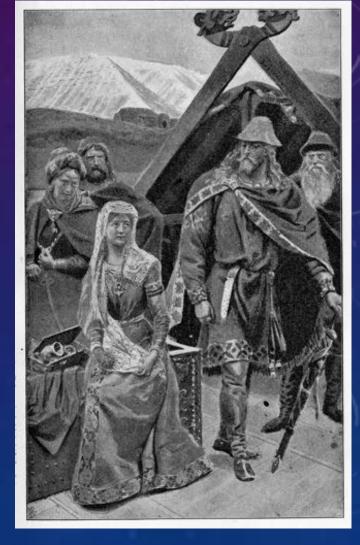
Objective validity (irrespective of peer opinion)

OUR STORY BEGINS IN EUROPE ABOUT 1500 YEARS

AGO

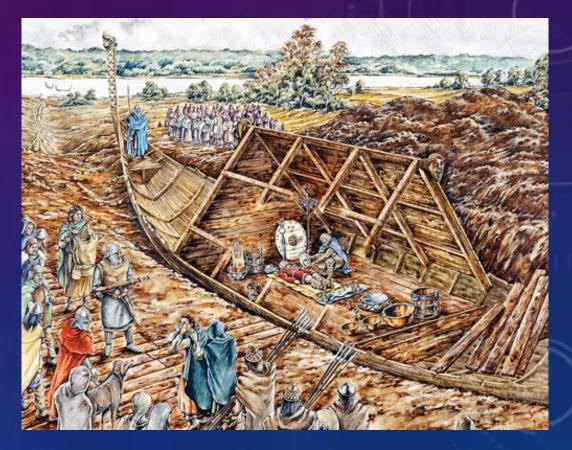
- We have information about the institutions (and therefore psychology) of ancient Europeans from
 - early law codes
 - Church documents and letters
 - travelers' reports
 - saints' biographies
 - Nordic and German sagas
 - analysis of ancient DNA
 - kinship terminologies in ancient writings
- From these sources, it appears that broad kinship patterns in pre-Christian Europe looked much like the rest of the world
 - This is evidence that European psychology resembled that in the rest of the world, at the time

LIFE WOULD HAVE BEEN DIFFERENT FOR YOU IN A EUROPEAN TRIBE ABOUT 1500 YEARS AGO

- Most European people lived in clans, tribes, or other kin groups
- Marriages were usually arranged
 - Patriarch might tell you who to marry
 - This could be a cousin, in many cases
 - Bride goes to live with husband's family
- Land can't be sold without consent of relatives
- Kin group provides security, settles disputes, avenges wrongs, maintains norms
 - Cares for sick and elderly
 - Accepts corporate responsibility in disputes with other kin groups
 - Conducts rituals, satisfies gods/ancestors
- Polygynous marriages were common for highstatus men

AS THE ROMAN EMPIRE RECEDED, EUROPE WAS OVERRUN BY POLYTHEISTIC NORTHERNERS AROUND 500 CE

- Clovis, king of the Franks, conquered most of what is now France
 - O Clovis was raised a pagan, became Christian, but remained "a thug with an axe"
- Saxons under Hengist moved into Britain
 - Saxons were pagans; displaced Christians in most of Britain except Wales, Cornwall, and Ireland
- Barbaric customs of the Northern Europeans replaced Roman justice, especially under Franks
 - Murder was punished by a fine
 - Judicial duels replaced legal process
 - Slavery was revived and extended
 - General contempt for rule of law

IN 500 CE, EUROPE WAS POOR, POPULATED BY ILLITERATE TRIBES

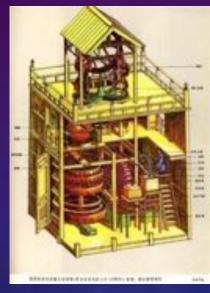

IN 750 CE, CHINA AND THE ISLAMIC WORLD WERE FAR WEALTHIER AND MORE DYNAMIC THAN EUROPE

Armillary sphere of Yi Xing (683-727), astronomer, mathematician, mechanical engineer, and Buddhist monk

- In China, the emperors of the Tang Dynasty (618 -907 CE) ruled a territory inhabited by 60 to 80 million people
 - The capital Chang 'An was the most populous city on Earth (more than a million inhabitants)
- Many inventions from Tang China
 - Gunpowder
 - Porcelain "china"
 - Gas cylinders
 - Air conditioning
 - Woodblock printing
 - Astronomical armillary sphere





- The Islamic empire had spread across several continents by 750 CE, with great speed
- The "House of Wisdom" (Bayt al-Hikma) was established in Baghdad by Caliph Harun al-Rashid (786-809 CE)
 - Center for studies of humanities and science in medieval Islam
 - Mathematics, astronomy, medicine, alchemy and chemistry, zoology, geography, cartography
 - Its scholars translated many Greek, Persian, and Indian texts into Arabic
 - Greatest repository of books in the world by 850 CE
- Emphasis on empiricism, and many experiments with lenses, mirrors, refraction, reflection from Ibn Al-Haytham (Alhazen) (c. 965 c. 1040)

AS THE LAST MILLENNIUM DAWNED, EUROPE DIDN'T AMOUNT TO MUCH

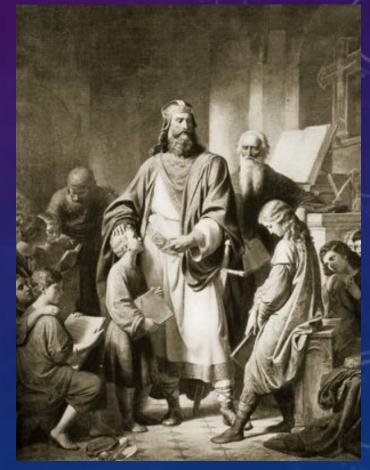
- Europe in the year 1000 CE was one of the world's more stagnant regions
 - Economically undeveloped
 - o Intellectually derivative
 - o Geopolitically passive
- Illiteracy, starvation, and disease were the norm

EARLY ON, CHARLEMAGNE (742-814) DECIDED TO DO SOMETHING ABOUT ILLITERACY

- Charlemagne was King of the Franks (after 768), later "Emperor of the Romans" from 800 to 814
- He unified much of western and central Europe in Carolingian Empire (800-888)
- Lack of Latin literacy caused problems by limiting number of court scribes
- So Charlemagne ordered the creation of "cathedral schools"
- He brought many scholars from all over the Christian world to his court
- One goal: creation of standardized curriculum for new schools
 - Trivium: rhetoric, logic, grammar
 - Quadrivium: arithmetic, geometry, music, astronomy
- Charlemagne loved books and learning, but it isn't clear that he himself could read or write

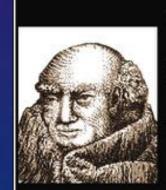


Charlemagne with his children and their scholars

9TH CENTURY IRISH MONKS BEGAN SPREADING OUT OVER EUROPE, TAKING LEARNING AND LITERACY WITH THEM

- European towns founded by, or linked to,
 Irish monks include:
 - Bobbio, Fiesole, Lucca, Taranto, Lumièges,
 Auxerre, Laon, Luxeuil, Liège, Trier,
 Wurzburg, Regensburg, Rheinau, Reichenau,
 Salzburg, Vienna, St. Gallen...
- Many dioceses in France, Germany, Austria,
 Switzerland, Holland, Italy have an Irish monk as their patron saint

"Almost all of Ireland, despising the sea, is migrating to our shores with so many philosophers." Heiric of Auxerre, *Life of St. Germanus* (870)



What, then, is it to treat of philosophy, unless to lay down the rules of the true religion by which we seek rationally and adore humbly God, who is the first and sovereign cause of all things? Hence it follows that the true philosophy is the true religion, and reciprocally that the true religion is the true philosophy.

CHRISTIANITY AND LEARNING WERE ALMOST SYNONYMOUS DURING MIDDLE AGES

- Literacy arrived with Christianity, in many regions of Europe
- Christianity produced religious and cultural unity within Europe, in the midst of political fragmentation
 - Latin language allowed natives of different regions to communicate
- Church and State were separate entities
 - One could protect scholars against the other
- Church was patron and founder of schools and universities
 - Church itself was example of a universitas -- fictive legal personality, unique to Roman law

JUDAEO-CHRISTIAN WRITERS DEVELOPED THE CONCEPT OF *LIBER NATURAE*, THE "BOOK OF NATURE"

Biblical writers long ago asserted that we could know God through Nature:

"The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they reveal knowledge." (Psalm 19)

- Augustine (354-430): "...consider the whole of creation, regarding God as its author, by reading so to speak in the great book of nature (magnus liber naturae rerum)" [cf. Contra Faustum, 32, 20]
- Hugh of St. Victor (1096-1141): "...the whole of this sensible world is like a book, written by the finger of God, being created by His power. And the individual creatures are like symbols or letters that are not invented in an arbitrary way by man, but ordained according to the will of God in order to demonstrate his wisdom" [Didasc., VII, PL 176, 873].*

CHRISTIANITY PROVIDED A PHILOSOPHICAL BASIS FOR A SCIENTIFIC WORLDVIEW

Philosophically, Christians (like Jews) believed that

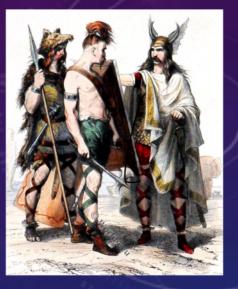
- God is a trustworthy Creator of a lawful cosmos
- The Universe is Creation, and is therefore good
 - o Knowledge of the physical world is real knowledge, unlike Plato's view
 - o The physical world is not the product of an evil demiurge, as Gnostics thought
- We should expect regularities, patterns, order, and law in creation, because God is faithful and consistent
- Reason is a valid tool for knowing God
- But human logic is limited, so we can't understand creation just by thinking about it, Greek-style – we must observe it
 - Empiricism and the Book of Nature we must "read" the Book by observing and experimenting
 - o Philosophy (science) is a gift from God, to read the Book of Nature
- Since we are created in God's image, we should expect ultimately to be able to understand creation

Christianity fostered literature and learning in Europe, prior to 1000 CE
